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The caller should not become despondent if his call is not immediately accepted

With regards to being rejected by the people when calling them to the Truth, the Shaykh Muhammad ibn Saalih al 'Uthaymeen (رَحِمَهُ اللهُ)¹ states:

So do not be sad, O caller to Allaah, if your speech is rejected or if it is not accepted the first time around, because you have carried out that which was obligatory upon you.

However know that if you spoke the Truth, desiring by that the Face of Allaah, then it will certainly have an effect; even if to your face it is rejected, then it will no doubt have an effect.

And in the story of Moosaa (عليه السلام)² is a lesson for the callers to Allaah. And that is that the sorcerers from every part of Egypt were gathered and they assembled and they threw down their ropes and their staffs until the ground seemed to be teeming with snakes, such that Moosaa (عليه السلام) had fear:

So Moosaa felt fear within himself.

[Soorah TaaHaa (the 20th chapter) aayah 67]

So when all of them gathered together, he said to them:

Woe to you! Do not invent a lie against Allaah, lest He destroy you with a punishment. And the one who invents a lie against Allaah will certainly fail miserably.

[Soorah TaaHaa (the 20th chapter) aayah 61]

Simple words.

Allaah, the Mighty and Majestic, said:

So they disputed with one another about what they should do.

[Soorah TaaHaa (the 20th chapter) aayah 62]

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أَرْحِمَهُ اللهُ (rahimahullaah) May Allaah the Most High have mercy on him

² (عليه السلام) (alaihis-salaam) Peace be upon him

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Meaning that they disputed with one another straightaway... So reflect how these words from Moosaa (عليه السلام) had an effect upon these sorcerers.

So it is a must that the word of Truth will have an effect; however sometimes it may have an effect straightaway and sometimes it (may have an effect) later on. And Allaah is the One who grants success.
